## The New Law From September $18^{\text {th }} 2006$

There will be a number of important changes to the law about the use of child seats in cars and goods vehicles on the 18th of September, this fact sheet will help you understand what they are.

## The New Law for Children up to 3 years old

## In the Front Seat

The child MUST use the correct child restraint.

## In the Rear Seat

The child MUST use the correct child restraint.
In a taxi, if a child restraint is not available then the child may travel unrestrained in the rear. This is the only exemption, and has been introduced for practical rather than safety reasons. You
 should always think about ways to make sure that a child seat is available.

It is the driver's legal responsibility to ensure that the child is correctly restrained.

## The New Law for Children over 3 and up to 1.35 m in height, or the age of 12



## In the Front Seat

The child MUST use the correct child restraint.

## In the Rear Seat

The child MUST use the correct restraint, where seat belts are fitted.

There are three exemptions, where a child in this category does not have to use a child restraint. In each case the child MUST use the adult belt instead. They are -

1) in a licensed taxi or licensed private hire vehicle;
2) if the child is travelling on a short distance for reason of unexpected necessity;
3) if there are two occupied child restraints in the rear which prevent the fitment of a third.

In addition, a child 3 and over may travel unrestrained in the rear seat of a vehicle if seat belts are not available.

It is the driver's legal responsibility to ensure that the child is correctly restrained.


## In the Front Seat

The adult seat belt MUST be worn if available.

## In the Rear Seat

The adult seat belt MUST be worn if available.
It is the driver's legal responsibility to ensure that the child is correctly restrained.

## Other New Changes to the Law from September

## Rear-ward Facing Child Seats

It will become illegal to use a rear-ward facing child restraint in a vehicle seat which is protected by an active front airbag.

## Buses, Coaches, and Minibuses

Seated passengers aged 14 years and over MUST use seat belts where they are fitted.
