I don't live in CCBC, but dog fouling and litter seem to be an issue on some of our estates.

I have a neighbour flytipping outside my property so had to put a screen up to hide the mess. Unsatisfactory support from the council.

I have just moved in to a brand new housing estate that is being built on Green belt land. Even though i am truly grateful for the property, i feel we should take care of the environment too.

i have noticed there a lot of pot holes in my area.

I like the access to countryside in my neighbourhood

I live in a lock of flats which has a common garden. Most of use are oaps and under lockdown would have been beneficial to sit in the garden. Grass was a few feet high so was impossibe

I live in fields park, the approach road is Gilboa road for years branches and brambles have grown into the road over the public bench when driving down you are forced into oncoming cars on a bend.

I live in Pontypandy and I'm happy with the appearance of my neighborhood. However built up traffic since the new drive in Costa near Macdonald's is not good. Causes congestion.

I live opposite Crosskeys College and recent work on Risca Road flats has been completed. However the two storage containers left on the grass verge directly outside my flat and become eyesores

I live towards the northern end of Islwyn Park and the leaves and seeds from the Silver Birch trees are a major nuisance. The leaves fill the gutters and cover the footpath

I was concerned in summer that lack of verge cutting at the side of roads by junctions led to some visibility issues.

If there is litter around that will always let a neighbourhood down

Illicit dumping and litter; dog mess and dog bags being left everywhere; overgrown grounds/trees;

I'm happy with the appearance with my neighbourhood its clean and safe

Inattention to the care of public spaces

Inconsiderate parking. Bins left on the street for days after collection.

It is the litter I pick up outside my house. Could bags/equipment be distributed to those residents who express willingness to collect litter?

Unable to walk safely on footpaths as overgrown, not swept/cleaned. Impossible if using a pram or wheelchair - vital to have safe access during lockdowns

Uncleaned roads. No leaf clearance. Non-regular ground clearance on paths and footways

Uncollected litter

Uncollected rubbish, fly tipping sites, pot holes in road. Many footpaths need better maintenance. Dog poo bins are overflowing in some areas

Under maintained areas all around local area.

Undeveloped back access lanes (priority to the most visible/used by public) and some poorly maintained public paths.

Without a doubt - litter in all forms, from Maccy D wrappers/general food waste and dog mess left or discarded by unthinking individuals to flytipping throughout the borough

working from our street causing noise and disturbance

Would like to see a skate park by the park on the green in Tir y Berth as I feel this would give children and people somewhere safe to exercise plus it would help to keep children off the roads

Yobbison behaviour in the village and no police around to curb it

Young people hanging around the main square as there is nowhere for them to go.

Zero help in rural areas

As we have hardly been out other than to work or provide childcare this is difficult to gauge,. I have heard of good community spirit but also of negative incidents.

Avoided as many people as possible do not want to contract C19 AS PER WG ADVICE

did not know many people in village before March 2020 and have not mixed since.

Have only moved tp my address recently

Haven't been out much

Hiding in isolation.

i answered don't know to these questions because i had no use of them although i think it was important for these services were available for people who needed them and on the whole i think tho council is doing a good job

I don't know because I have been unable to be involved in my community recently due to the social distancing rules.

I don't know what has been organised during the pandemic for people in need. There is no community spirit that I know about.

I don't live in CCBC

I have no idea because I have not personally seen any evidence of there being any community spirit anywhere on my estate or anywhere in Penpedairheol - in fact possibly the opposite - total selfishness and a complete failure to help anyone even by abiding with the recommendations for face masks and staying home!

I have received no contact from anyone luckily I am capable of getting out and about and looking after myself which to be frank is a good job as I have had no contact whatsoever

I haven't been going out much.

I moved here during Covid so I dont know how it was before

I only moved into Caerphilly on Lockdown Day! Therefore I cannot say if there's been a change, however, the neighbours in my close welcomed me and included me in their ad-hoc arrangements for collecting shopping etc.

I rarely go out so i don't really have an idea on the spirit of the community.

I think people in our area have generally kept to themselves, aside from a socially distanced VE Day event.

Initally more community spirit but this has lessened reccently. Still an improvement however

local shop is the only place i have been due to the pandemic - community spirit is usually very good in my village

Moved here 18 months ago and after breaking my ankle a year ago and it now causing mobility issues and then COVID-19 arriving, I've had little opportunity to meet anyone beside my direct neighbours and my daughter, so can't answer many of these questions. There seems little to do in the area, the gym closed following the flooding and the library etc is up a very steep hill which I can no longer get up or down and I don't drive so getting around is difficult too.

My wife and I (both 76) have isolated ourselves from Day 1 only going out when absolutely necessary

New estate so hard to judge

Newbridge has too many ex prisoners in the area: xxxxxxx Too much drugs

No felt any difference from my perspective.

not sure to be honest

Nothing accessible for us throughout pandemic despite raising issues..we are BSL users

Only people we see are relatives

WE ARE 75 AND DIDN'T USE ANY FACILITIES, ONLY AFTER LOCAL LOCKDOWNWE USED THE RECYCLE TIP AND QUEUED FOR 2 HOURS, THIS SERVICS LEADS TO FLY TIPPING.

We weren't offered any support from the doctors when my husband had a stroke. Only one neighbour helped us when we moved a bed downstairs, we are in our 80s

a lot of people in my street have not engaged in the rules, carrying on as normal regards family, friends and house parties etc.

although the community has helped each other and looked out for each other, overall levels of community spirit have decreased as events and sports etc which bring the community together have not been permitted to proceed

As i said in previous question the general public has become disheartened , due to the neglect by Caerphilly Council.

As we are not able to mix, there was very little of the community to speak to.

Because everyone had to keep 2 metres apart

because living in a small village you do not see many people

Common sense, the average Covid death related to age is 82. Younger people catch it, in larger numbers, but not abide by the rules, work it out?

Community spirit has all but evaporated as we are discouraged from meeting or gathering together and, most of the time, we cannot see other people's faces and expressions. The covid restrictions have dehumanising and depressing.

Crime rate up, everyone ignoring social distance and mask wearing, Senghenydd valley covered in school children's used masks

Disabled but not offered any help from neighbours

Disabled hate crime and anti social behaviour

don't mix or help one and other

Drug abusers, alcoholics and criminal activity!

due to pubs and other places closing less chance of community spirit

Everyone for themselves attitude

Everyone of my age was keeping safe and shielding

Everything is online now so if you dont have Facebook you miss out

Fed up and disgusted at the way it's managed

Feel like at the moment it's dog eat dog out there

frustrating to see neighbours breaking lockdown rules and releasing fireworks on the bit of green outside our home terrifying our pets.

Frustrations with restrictions and differing opinions regarding them

I am 76 and faily active so just getting on with things but am aware of people in similar situations that had had a call enquiring if they need any help from one of the serivces. I haven't had a call from anyone. Is this the case - who shouts the loudest gets heard?

I believe at the start community's did support but as time has gone on people attitude is changing

i dont know anyone i moved to risca last year and dont know any support groups or what the area has to offer

I think neighbours breaking covid rules have led to divisions between households

I think people are fed up of restrictions, therefore the community spirit which was first there when it was a novelty very quickly disappeared. I also think people have less time for each other, and tolerance for those who don't follow the rules is not there.

If you are in isolation who do you see?

In such a small town people generally meet in social spaces such as pubs and clubs, but that has not happened as often.

In the original lockdown I think there was a feeling of we're all in it together. Now I think people have become complacent, selfish and scared to interact

Initially was more community spirit as time went on, and by second lockdown it was actually less than before

It was in the beginning, but since people were encouraged to report neighbours breaking the rules, it's divided everyone. After all this time you are now making children wear masks in school! How can children function and thrive when they can't see people's faces. You are causing untold damage and are supporting the divide of the mask v unmasked

Little community spirit on new build estates. Everyone too busy working

Lockdown led to those with drink and drug issues gathering outside and drinking heavily for 12hrs a day, resulting in quiet living neighbours being threatened by drunkards and drug-takers and property damage. Caerphilly Council did nothing to help and protect the aged and vulnerable. Shame on you.

Locking people away and committing war crimes against them is disgusting.

my local meeting place "The Crown" pub, is closed and due for demolition. This adds to the destruction of community spirit.

Neighbours are afraid of socialising, the restrictions have made neighbours always suspicious and nosy and very judgemental of others actions. Increased gossiping and complaining.

Neighbours fighting in the street more and more noisy house parties

No atmosphere, speak to people with my mask on and theirs and they ignore you

No care with people in what so ever

No one around

No one is meeting up

no one looks in on elder peapole

No one seems bothered

no self isolation they could not care less

Nobody could go anywhere to meet anybody.

Nobody follows distancing etc they slate the nhs on fb

Noisy neighbours. Street racers taking advantage of empty roads. People not obeying lockdown rules.

Not contacted by anyone outside my family

Not seeing people so unable to contact or socialize.

Not seeing people, people avoiding one another even if pass, scurrying away.

One neighbour has caused lots of problems with noise and light pollution by working from home after unsocial hours of the day and on Sundays. The council have yet to answer my complaints as they tell me they are overwhelmed with these sorts of iasues during the Pandemic.

Our neighbours had parties most weekends in their house

People are nervous. There is less contact between people (verbally)

People are understandably more concerned for themselves.

People attacking other people over social distancing and mask wearing making decisions in society

People avoid each other as much as they can

People becoming complacent about COVID, caring less about keeping their communities safe.

People fed up of not being able to access recycling centres without having to wait in endless queues for ages. If people are wearing masks then there should be no problem accessing the service as normal. It is very rare that you actually come into contact with a Recycling Centre Operative. The permit scheme can also be in operation and done online. The Council have failed dismally in their approach in operating these Centres. It is not surprising when your out and about and you see rubbish dumped by bins in laybys, mattresses and the likes dumped in lanes.

People just want to find fault with anything. Teenagers/rubbish/dog poo. It's ridiculous, I appreciate we're all going through tough times but this has just brought the worst out in people. There is nothing good to look forward to

People seemed to be misinformed as to the effects of self isolating in addition, the host of conspiracy theories did not help people make informed decisions. Finally, the government regulations were at best, ambiguous.

People snitching on each other, curtain-twitchers, everyone frightened of each other, neighbours taking advantage of the situation to do whatever they want, flytipping through the roof, streets not safe at night because there is so little street lighting, removing disabled parking bays to put in ridiculous 'cafe culture' street seating that is NEVER used, appalling signage in towns making the place look like a biohazard area, dystopian electronic road signs to flash messages about social distancing, not bothering to try and open the libraries for 8 months, taking months to open leisure centres, surly recycling staff, bending over backwards to the Welsh Government to send us into a local lockdown first then dangle a carrot in front of our faces every week that it would be 'lifted' only to be thrown into the 'firebreak' with everyone else, not bothering to answer any letters or emails, council can't be bothered to empty waste/dog bins, allowing the proliferation of fly tipping without doing a thing (though you're quick enough to put up dystopian digital signs to tell people to socially distance and remove protest signs, aren't you? Still, STILL paying xxxxx a former chief executive!!! Caerphilly council is a joke and it's destroying community spirit.

Personally, I feel that there has been too many selfish people carrying on as normal, which has impacted on those who thought before doing anything or going anywhere.

Rush to panic buy. Poor social distancing application by many individuals and by some superstores, e.g. Asda

Seen so many break lockdown rules if you mention it you never spoke to again

Selfishness on the rise

Since the first lock down where we made contributions to the NHSthis has been relaxed during this wave of the pandemic.

Swimming lessons were cancelled since March as compared to other areas in Wales & England. Children and adults have been deprived of such sport to maintain their health which also offers a massive social experiencewothin a safe environment. Covid is not transferred in chlorinated water as scientifically proven.

The council has left the people to suffer without services we had beforehand. This must stop.

The enforced isolation and separation has meant less contant with other community residents in cafes, parks, libraries, churches, shops etc. That lower level of contacct and interaction has an adverse impact on community spirit.

The lack of mask wearing and social distancing shows just how little regard for others many in the community have

The level of civic disobedience was fairly large to start with and has become worse with the passing of time.

the minority are making it worse for all

The pandemic has brought out the best but also the worst in people.

The pubs - restaurants are are still trading. People going out and drinking can not be considered in good community spirit. When people are dying from a virus that is spread by people socialising. It's idiotic.

There are 8 houses in xxxx, only people in Number x have spoken to me since March

there's a lot of do gooders, jumping on the band waggon trying to make a name for themselves, they do this while putting others at risk. (handing out parcels to others spreading the virus) we are supposed to be in lockdown and isolation, how do they know they or the recipients don't have the virus. also a xxxx in the area held a birthday party and an outbreak occurred, the council closed them down but never fined them or refused a alcohol licence to them (that's a joke), people of the valley were too afraid to even go shopping in the village knowing that a outbreak occurred and they were the culprits. organising and arranging the turning on of tree lights with Santa present created a gathering so large that traffic could not get through. there are some worried and venerable people in the village and if they put something on social media they are shot down because of the ignorance of a certain few. (so only a few will say anything) . when there was the 1st lock down people really took it serious and everyone stuck to the rules, however as time went on its like there's no virus.

Too many people not heeding the advice to protect themselves and others.

Total lack of interest from my estate

Two things - People are afraid to become infected so has resulted in less face to face community spirit and people are quicker to judge - especially the younger people

Unable to walk on one leg for 18 months. Council stated no help at all available of any kind so under lockdown, two years. Totally alone, no friends, no family, couldnt even cook a meal. Crime everywhere.Now I can walk a little, could be mugged in the dark without late street lighting

Very rare to see neighbours

Village shops have poor distancing safety, poorly enforced and still mainly cash only payments

walking through caerphilly town people are less friendly I feel and are wary of each other, particularly if others are not wearing masks. Sometimes people ignore the one way system in the town centre by the band stand which is inconsiderate.

Was more initially but now I feel like everyone just judges everyone else's choices and behaviour. less community spirit everywhere

We do not leave the house and see anyone

We stopped clapping so unless I left the house I never had neighbour contact (other than with 2 on the above mentioned app).

well neighbours disobeying rules brought problems and arguments

What can change except the fact that people have had to isolate so how do you build up community spirit when all there is to talk about is this pandemic and the stupidity of the Welsh Assembly who do not listen.

You can't change people attitudes and they way they have been brought up, drugs and law breakers rule our community with little support or impact from the authorities

because we where all at home we got to know each other more and helped each other. We also had a V-E party for the street all be it in our own gardens, that was great every one got involved.

Checking on health of each other

I am aware and have donated to a few groups making sure vulnerable people get food and the majority of people are doing their bit wearing masks

I believe people have engaged with others more than normal because of the situation we are all in ,to offer help and support, hope it continues

I believe we started looking out for each other better because of being at home more.

I catch a bus on a daily basis and many more people, including the often-maligned students, have all been more inclined to say hello

I generally hear supportive comments being shared in conversations between neighbours and people in my community.

I have been at home more and spoke to my neighbours more

I have been told that varies neighbours offered to do shopping etc, for vulnerable local people.

I have got to know more of my immediate neighbours especially during Clap for Carers/NHS. I have had homemade cakes left on my doorstep and another neighbour rings my doorbell if she sees my cat waiting to be let in

I have got to know neighbours better and people say hello and stop and talk when out and about

I have gotten to know my neighbours a lot better and have built better relationships with them.

I have made an effort to shop locally to support local businesses.

I have public greens outside my house and along the rows. As we knew the council weren't going to be cutting the grass, a few of us got together and cut them ourselves and continued to do so.

i have seen more of my community working from home, I have shopped more locally, used the local countryside for walks. meeting people along the way (SD measures applied) seen community pulling together on social media, activities for children to take part in safely, rock painting & finding

I have spoken to neighbours in the last six months that i haven't spoken to other than hello for years. Much more friendly atmosphere everywhere in Caerphily

I know all of my neighbours now whereas previously had only known about half

I know more of my neighbours now.

I made my community aware of the need to help needy families to manage. I was thrilled with the support of help with contributions to enable this to happen

I notice lots of offers of help for disadvantaged and vulnerable families on social media

I noticed a volunteer service centre.

I personally have assisted financially to food bank group to help the more venerable and assisted the BMMR Trust.

I set up a facebook support group for my street at the start of the pandemic. People now knbow each others names. There were many offers of support and a neighbour brought me shopping on a few occasions (I am a wheelchair user and vulnerable)

I think it was always there but Covid needed it to really shine

I think some people have made more of an effort to get to know their neighbours and help out in any way they can.

I think the already positive community spirit in Bedwas improved initially and there has been a lot of support for vulnerable people. This may have lessened a bit during recent months.

I am not from Caerphilly and live in an affluent part of town where neighbours move in rather than being based in the community, as people are well off there is less need for community support.

I am quiet independent and have a good family support network around me, immediate neighbours are very helpful.

I didn't see any help in the neighbourhood. Nor did I need to use any help.

I have been concerned for several years neighbours do not know each other. In some part of the borough I guess people have been doing more to help each other

I haven't noticed any difference. Try to keep my distance from people.

I havent seen a change in my community as I havent been out in 12 months

I haven't seen any change in community spirit

I isolated quite a lot throughout, only going out to do a bit of shopping or something else.

I know who if my neighbour's I can trust

I live in Gilfach Bargoed and have been a resident here all of my life. There was a community spirit pre-Covid, many residents look out for their neighbours. During the Spring lockdown, a number of residents in certain streets pushed the collective spirit to excess, garden visits for friends and family barbeques were taken to excess in some instances / street gatherings for clap for carer's / VE Day sparked ritualised "pavement" gatherings on set days of the week. Many people showed their support for the NHS on social media / clap for carers to be "seen" to be in support, the reality for many was observed to the contrary and I don't see many rainbows on social media now we are in a crisis. I therefore view some residents of the Borough in a negative light, others have behaved exemplary and are genuinely looking to support each other which explains the reasoning of community spirit staying the same.

I think there was a good community spirit in my area pre Covid. Since Covid some people have engaged with the community more, but some have engaged far less. So overall I think it has stayed the same.

I wouldn't say the community as a whole has a spirit, the community these days seems to be just the few houses that surround your own.

I'm fairly new to the area, so don't really have the contacts with the wider community. But my neighbours are friendly and supportive, and people stop and say hello.

Initially I had hope for a kinder and more compassionate society. In recent months we've become more divided again thanks to a blame culture.

Initially increased community spirit but this changed during summer as some took more liberties & ignored rules i.e. VE day celebrtaions!

A couple of my neighbours totally ignored the rules even in the first lockdown - this was totally frustrating!

A number of CCBC office staff that I know appear to be suffering from increased mental health and work life issues and reduced social interaction from extended home working but are afraid to raise this concern with their Employer

Ads we are aged 78 and 80, there was no contact from anyone other than my son and grandson who live with us, to do some shopping etc

All in all I think the council have done a good job in many areas. Environmental health and planning enforcement seem overwhelmed during this time and have been unable to help with my requests for help. I believe my neighbours are taking advantage of the situation and their behaviour has severely affected my mental health. the closure of the 24 hour team that was helping me before the Pandemic and the understandable inability of the council to conduct house visits has meant that my neighbours can do as they please, which is distressing for me.

Although safety is paramount during these difficult times, the government and local authority have clearly not thought through families who have 2 full time workers, one being a key worker AND another who works in the private sector and employer who does not allow working from home. So when schools are finishing term early, there is no choice but to mix families due to no childcare available. If it is, we are not aware of it. Unfortunately, the schools were very slow on the uptake of social media to enable lessons through the use of teams or Zoom. Parents who must continue working would have relied heavily on that. It now appears that schools are closing early so that the teachers can isolate in order to see their elderly relatives during Christmas. Most of the private sector does not have this luxury either and must also find some way of getting childcare for their children at extremely short notice.

Altogether - a job very well done. Team Caerphilly in action!

Always appeared the Council was too ready to follow the lockdown instructions from the Welsh Government too readily and easily without any challenge. We were in lockdown very early and there appeared no clear exit route. We did the best we could in our area in those harsh extended lockdown conditions.

Apart from refuse collection, the Council have not been seen to be doing anything in the area

As a ccbc employee and resident I feel we have responded very well, overcoming huge service delivery hurdles. working from home on such large scale was something that I would never have thought I would have seen in my lifetime. buddy scheme worked well and I met lots of lovely locals I never would have otherwise.

As a cyclist I regularly cycle around South East Wales usually entering RCT, Cardiff, Vale of Glamorgan and Newport. When I was restricted to Caerphilly CBC i cycled to places that I haven't visited for years and some never. My only complaint is the hills but you have no control over them!!! Free parking in Council Car Parks has helped. My wife has a heart condition and therefore cannot cycle up

hills to much but enjoys cycling on the flat or slight inclines so we took the car to Penallta Car park then cycled to Risca and back. She just about coped but the free parking helped us as pensioners

As a general comment - there have been different information for different areas and people were confused. During the Caerphilly lockdown people were not aware of the Caerphilly borough boundaries.

As a self employed person I used your business advice service and found this really helpful and useful. I also became aware of the fact that your building new business units in Nelson and Rhymney, which I think is fantastic. I've wanted a council unit for years but the ones that are affordable to me are too old and not suitable. Private unit owners want too much money for new units so I think its brilliant that your building new ones and would ask you to consider building more. A lot of people I know would like new units and have the council landlord. My mother had a buddy during the lockdown and she was very lovely and helpful and took so much pressure off me while I was trying to keep my business going and trying to get grants and help.

As a unifying factor C19 helped. However, I am utterly dismayed at the UK, Welsh government, and Local Authorities (Police's) failure to stop large gatherings like the BLM protests that undoubtedly cost lives.

As far as i am aware services have continued as normal.

As stated above I as not aware of any changes you had made or what was available. How was this communicated? I suggest you review your communication channels to be more wide reaching in future to ensure everyone is aware

As vulnerable adults we try to keep out of the way of people and places. We have 2/3 hr walks in country parks and common land in the morning and 1 hour at nights Badly.

Been far to lax with shops, clubs, public houses and the general public where found to be breaking Covid 19 rules causing more infections

being self employed and working on a farm, we have received no support off anyone,

Biggest issue the council does not publish rate per 100,000 by area. There is a public need for name and shame to drive home seriousness of personal responsibility. There is a distinct embarrassment with figures just bland words.

By not closing playgrounds children and adults are riskung spreading the virus through cross contamination. Groups of xhildren congregating without masks etc.

Caerphilly Council has been supportive of volunteer groups helping in the community

Caerphilly council has done its best with the budget it has available and in these extreme circumstances. I fear for the future of this country specifically wales its lack of opportunity for young people and the massive unemployment this pandemic has created will have a long term effect on our nation and in the country as a whole.

Caerphilly Council's regular Open Letter is a good way to keep up to date with restrictions. It's easy to sign up.

Caerphilly lock down didn't work more house parties

CCBC has followed the mainstream narrative and it has had the same detrimental impact that has occurred across the nation. I am not aware of anything that CCBC has done to take account of local situations. It's been a lot of restrictions for no obvious gain, but a lot of damage to individuals' finances, businesses and health.

Ccbc made an excellent response to the pandemic. Kept us well informed of help and assistance available. I did not use any of the services but I know many people who did, and were grateful for all the help given.

CCBC's response has been incredible. The Buddy scheme and the FSM planning, preparation and deliveries have been well coordinated and worthwhile so those who are most in need.

Collective response has been fantastic just a shame to see that a councilor who lives next door to a person receiving help through the buddy scheme did not get involved.

Collectively I believe that in the main we have responded well to the pandemic. However in every collection of people there are some who are unable to conform to advice which they see as interfering with their free will. Unfortunately they will always be with us.

Collectively no, individually paddled my own canoe and any medical or psychological help I needed I sourced myself.

Communication could be improved on social media

Community spirit has enriched our lives - 'we are in it together' has been evident

Confusing. Isolation poor problems. Doctor's surgeries not helpful

Could have done a lot better in extending the original lockdown period and making the wearing of masks compulsory both then and now.

Council did not reach out to all vulnerable oaps. Many Did not know that the council were able to help them with shopping and other essential chores.

Council has done a first rate job

Covid has had a massive effect on my mental health and it's been extremely had to get the right support and help

Creativity and innovation has been impressive all over. Glad council was able to harness the huge amount of people looking to volunteer to help. Hugely untapped resource.

acting too slowly to the pandemic the council wasted time in getting rid of swings from parks but leaving the rest open. They limited where younger children could go such as toddler groups. There was no support for the elderly in the community who lived alone without family to help with getting essentials so they were forced to use council transport. People without the Internet or access to TV weren't informed of updates and rules. No food banks were set up in the area and as a result of closing nurseries many people were loosing income staying at home. As the restrictions of shops have been in the few months up to Christmas it now means when things re open seams of groups are going to be heading to the CBD and busy shopping centres to catch up on Christmas shopping. It is going to be especially difficult to control this. By restricting what people buy in store on the lead up to Christmas is essentially asking for a higher foot fall in shops just before Christmas. This is especially worrying as there will also be many school children as they are now in the holidays.

Dangerous to walk on footpaths as overgrown, not wide enough for pram/wheelchair because overgrown. Made going out for exercise dangerous and inclined not to go! Cant understand why footpaths have been allowed to get into such a state to be too dangerous to use!

Decision to close public areas - eg parks, walks etc was a bad decision

Didn't know you had

Difficult to comment on this situation really as this has been thrown at everyone, everywhere - a learning curve

Disappointed in reduction in bulky rubbish collections when more people working on their properties. Good doing free council car parks

Dissapointed in clarity of communication as more detail on locations of outbreaks, enforcement and other action could have been much better. What did work well was services such as refuse centres giving waiting times. Leisure centres could have provided information about offer to suspend membership much earlier as I cancelled membership before offer was clear. You may have lost members as a result.

Don't know of any to start with

During the course of my employment, xxxx, the main complaint I received from the public was that whenever and whoever they telephoned - they had difficulty in getting an answer. - No one answered the telephone!

During the initial Covid 19 months I could not understand why the Recycling Centers were closed and then when reopened the number of staff allocated to these venues was excessive. These venues could have remained opened to ensure the public were able to dispose of their excess rubbish in the correct way. The amount of fly tipping has appeared to increase costing the council more money to clear.

Everyone totally ignoring rules. No face masks or noses not concealed. No social distance. No police arresting as they do abroad. Lockdowns need to be longer (4 weeks) and visibly enforced by LAW

Excellent communication through emails

Excellent council website and updates via email so people know what is changing and how we must all change our way of living to keep safe and respond to the pandemic.

Experiencing a parental bereavement in April 2020 was beyond difficult and financial / probate processes are still ongoing, 8 months on. Registering the death was difficult and repetitive despite council staff being understanding and doing their best at the time. Not sure Tell Us Once worked at all. Received numerous check up / ressurance telephone calls for mum after the death. Calls were well meant though. Feel the Council's response providing shopping / prescription / well-being support was outstanding Schools and Early Years services have responded amazingly and should be congratulated - both in providing support and services throughout to children and families. Concerned though about missed groups, schooling and opportunities with the inequalities gap increasing.

Fabulous service for school meals as seen online excellent support from local businesses

Far too many politicians talking far too much and far too long about C-19. It probably depresses many folk and would certainly bore me to tears if I didn't switch off.

Feel proud that we have come together as a community. It makes a huge difference to locals to feel part of a wider and caring network

Found Covid was the excuse to do nothing or the bare minimum. Called council as neighbours fence that had recently been installed by the council had come down damaging my property. Told because of Covid, there's nothing they can do. The grass wasn't cut, roads weren't fixed to name a few things that weren't attended to. So I just wonder what exactly have the council been doing. That fence isn't priority, fair enough, but I don't see why I should pay out on top of the damages for a fence I had no say in.

Free car parking initiative, I now shop more often in local shops

Free carparks

Free parking in Blackwood should be continued until Easter but get rid of stupid situation where Traffic Wardens fine people for using shopping centre

Free school meals are supplied to people on income support. Their income hasn't changed so why provide meals in school holidays. If you check social media a lot of the meals were given away. Total waste of money. People who were unable to work because of covid or on low wages should have been prioritised.

From my own experiences too many people have ignored the requests to limit mixing with others, generally the attitude from our citizens who we have seen shopping or taking exercise has been very good natured and humorous but they are not happy with the way the politicians have responded, frequently making decisions that make little sense to many of us. Of course we all realise it is not an easy situation to have to deal with, but the chance to impress us with their decision making has clearly passed them by.

Generally speaking Caerphilly has reacted well

Getting a slot in home delivery for shopping was extremely difficult, We gave up and relied on our daughter to shop for us

Good level of communication through a variety of channels Very prompt service of administering Govenment grants for business

great teamwork and the commitment and resilience of staff to adapt to new ways of working and delivery of service was excellent.

Great to have regular newsletter well done

Greatfull for the upcoming dates

Has Covid been used not to fulfil certain council tasks. I.e. litter and public bins

Have obeyed requirements of authority, when known!

how the hell can you ask a loaded question about homelessness being less in the pandemic when nobody was out and about to see anything? typical labour council trying to claim a win when there hasn't been anything changed by them

Hubs could have been set up for the last week of Autumn term to overcome strain on nhs and would allow better preparation time for teachers instead of late notice of school closures.

I agreed with the non grass cutting in non essential areas and feel that it should continue to create better diversity in the future. It's been good to hear about the many support agencies etc that stepped up to help those in need. I feel the community is split in its response to the pandemic with many people not taking the pademic or measures seriously enough.

I am a freelance swimming teacher and managed to keep working in England as pools and lessons remained ongoing, just modified. Risca leisure centre want to hire me but lessons are not due to restart until March next year. Swimming is a life

skill and an important factor in keeping everybody safe aswell as healthy and strong. I feel this sport has been undermined by non scientific reasons and not to reopen swimming lessons is simply not justified.

I am so pleased that I moved to Wales from England, as the official response has been so much better and people were more caring for others. However, after the initial lockdown I felt that adherence which had been really good fell away, partly because of lack of interest in the rules, pandemic fatigue and because it felt as if the risk was being overstated. Most people didn't know of many others who had the virus, a significant number wanted to socialise regardless, and so they did. I think that more specific communication would assist in compliance. Rather than simply giving facts and figures, presenting anonymous but true case histories which illustrate the impact one person had would make more impact. For example, 'Jane lived in a small town and worked in a local shop. She had two children in the local school and her husband travelled to Cardiff once a week for their shopping. Theirs was a close knit family and after the initial lockdown and the sense of relief the falling numbers brought, Jane started to see more of the people she had missed so much' ... you get the idea. It develops into her contracting the virus and then shows how easily and quickly it spread through her family before she even realised she had it, then the effects of all of their contacts. In my opinion this actually speaks to people in a far more effective way than just constantly hearing that more people have died, which eventually results in compassion fatigue. Presenting a different story each week or two, perhaps contrasting it with a story from a contact tracer, then one from a nurse or doctor etc. may well have far more impact as it makes the situation more personal and more 'real' to individuals. At the same time it is important not to lose the bigger systemic picture as well because without that as context then the details of the individual stories can act as a distraction. As with many things, taking into account both the cognitive/rational and the emotional/personal aspects, intertwining them and keeping the awareness that they are all parts of the same situation is an effective tool, in my opinion.

I am unaware of any response by the council

I appreciate the newsletters received electronically from CCBC and in paper format from Nelson Community Council

I believe CCBC are the best at dealing with problems

I believe that everyone has done their best in challenging circumstances. However it has highlighted how the council needs to adapt to using agile working and IT systems more. There should also be more focus on the environment/ climate change policies that support a new way of doing things. We could be a forerunner in technologies for this. We could also be a forerunner in changing our social care model. The council has shown that it does not need to be slow to adapt but it should not be about being responsive it should be about being proactive. The council has the opportunity to do things differently, be bold and change the face of how we govern but I suspect there will be little true change and things will revert to being done as they always have been done, as soon as the pandemic passes.

I disagree with closing all toilets we all need to go whether there's a Pandemic or not !!! and I will not go far because of it.

i disagree with the closing of the shops, pubs and hotels - these areas are kept to a high standard of hygiene and safety unlike everyone's homes where mass groups are now congregating - waste of money mass testing in Merthyr - as soon as you tell someone they are negative they let their guard down hence a massive spike after testing

I don't believe there was a collective response, merely a lot of individual ones - most for the better, but with some people ignoring the crisis as far as they could.

I don't feel I have enough support for my son who has autism. So I struggle to go anywhere and not always have anyone to help with food shopping

I don't think the council or police have been visible enough in lockdown, especially during the firebreak where walking through the village or going to the supermarket or travelling on public transport, you can clearly see people or groups not distancing or following the rules, hence why we're going into a third wave.

I feel like we have been left to our own devices in our valley. When going into Caerphilly town, many signs for social distancing, follow the rules, wear a mask indoors etc. But in our village there are no Council signs. I have been into the shops/post office in our village where the shop owner was not wearing a mask, or wearing one on his chin. This should be policed/enforced more by the council. People are often visiting each others houses too, people need to be educated (even a letter would be better than nothing) on the dangers in this. But the valley is left to find out this info for themselves (which includes fake news) and is then spread on our local facebook group. Very worrying.

I feel that most private sectors like retail are back in work now so there is no reason why the council is still running on remote working. There are departments where the phone lines aren't connected. You phone customer services and they are no help. I have been chasing a council tax bill for 2 months and you suddenly send me a massive back dated bill the week before Christmas. While I'm still waiting for a reimbursement for a new house build travel incentive. The council was badly run and inefficient before covid. I didn't think it would get much better

I feel that the majority of people have acted responsibly during this year so far, aside from the minority that have total disregard for the law or other people's lives, or their own.

I feel the response has been fantastic, its not something we knew would happen but as a whole I felt supported by my council through the pandemic.

I feel the withdrawal of parking enforcement has made it very difficult for residents who have permit parking bays outside their homes. During the first lockdown in March it was fine as everyone stayed home, but since this ended people did not adhere to local lockdown rules and the parking permit bays in residential areas continue to be abused by non permit holders without consequence due to a lack of enforcement.

I feel too much of decisions made are public sector driven. All appeasing union lead. Little regard to the private sector. Hence the disasterous results

I felt Caerphilly responded very well and very quickly to support vulnerable residents and children in the area. The school meals system was very well done. I work in a school in the area and i think the guidance has been well presented and feel my welfare and safety as staff has been important.

I felt that closing the recycling centres through the borough during the lockdown was unnecessary and short sighted. Many people used that period of time to do work on there homes and would have benefitted from these centres being open, they are outdoors and now they are open they are showing that they can function effectively whilst still maintaining distancing etc. I do feel that closing them increased fly tipping within the borough

I found that the places I used to walk became overcrowded with people who had never used them before so it made taking a walk a risk.

I found the closure of the recycling site really frustrating during the pandemic.

I had e offered my help but no one on my street responded.

I have been amazed by how generous people have been. However, also dismayed at how selfish some have been in openly flouting lockdown rules to meet people outside their own bubble. It has been alarming to see photos of people doing this on social media. I'm also dismayed at the number of people following conspiracy theories and blaming Welsh Government for making the rules that keep us safe. I have been left feeling very disillusioned with the public in general but any support I have sought from Local Services have been available

I have been very satisfied with the response overall.

I have been walking more in the local area during the pandemic; everywhere I went had overflowing dog mess bins or people had just stacked bags on the top of the bin.

I have beencompleely isolated so cannot give a valid answer

I have found accessing some council services difficult, particularly when your staff are working from home. It seems that the link between customer services and individual departments is not consistent.

I have helped my elderly mother as much as possible but most elderly people seem to be either independent or only want assistance off their own family.

I have seen other streets near me make a real effort to support each other through the last 9 months or so. I have appreciated the work the ccbc employees have done to continue to collect the refuse but other than that a lot of things in my area have fallen by the wayside. More effort needs to be made to promote green spaces that can be available for people to take exercise such as walking to help with mental health and general wellbeing

I heard about this virus November 2020 I think more should had been done earlier than March 2020 also I do blame Boris Johnson should had lock down in January 2020 I also believe we should have total lock down now for a month I also think the council should be spraying inside and outside of shelter housing complex in borough but that is opinion also all visitor's should sign book on entry into complex. Thankyou

I live in a rural area and for me the pandemic made my home and usual places of exercise very difficult and I have in fact not enjoyed the countryside as I would have otherwise. The footfall past my property meant that both me and my children didn't want to leave our property to exercise our horses, as we would have otherwise. We had issues with strangers wanting to feed our horses and I felt intruded on.

I own a business that operates in Caerphilly and Merthyr council areas. I found Merthyr council and Business Wales very unhelpful. I would like to give mention to Geoff Peters and Steven Wilcox in your Business Team as without their help, support and advice I wouldn't have known where to turn or how to access the different forms of support. There was so much information out there that it was really confusing and other avenues I tried weren't helpful.

i personally think the restrictions should have been uk wide and all the same time as it was in march

I really appreciated Caerphilly's approach to childcare for key-workers, free school meals, and regular communication.

I really can't understand why the rubbish tips closed. It was just asking for flytipping, as I had confirmed by one of your men.

I still pay 10% of my salary to travel to work in a hospital despite the job being one I could do at home if the NHS actually valued its staff and their wellbeing.

I tested positive for covid and didn't receive any help with food parcels or my bills and now I can't start my job until after christmas

I think needed to be more coordinated on social media between Government and councils and local service boards- to counteract the fake fact and falsehoods and a lack of compliance to the rules

I think as a Council, you aim to include people really well, but then it is down to individuals within the borough to work together as a Unit. Some people may have less facilities than others in which to enable them to do this.

I think Caerphilly Comcil respnded superbly to the pandemic, setting up the Buddy scheme that proved to be a valuable service to so many. Providing free school meals across the Borough.

I think Caerphilly council responded fairly well overall. I use the bus a lot and some buses the driver did not wear a mask and there wasn't always a window open to let the air circulate but other than that everything was alright in my opinion.

I think CCBC has generally done well. I am a lawyer and have found your office staff have strived to assist in difficult circumstances. I work on the main street in Caerphilly and have seen most people trying to comply with the various rules and requirements.

I think CCBC has shown an amazing response to the pandemic and the staff have strongly pulled together to support the community. Over and above other authorities in Wales in my opinion. No mean feat given the size of the organisation and I hope the residents realise how lucky they are to live in this authority.

I think CCBC have been one of the best councils with regards to responding positively to Covid-19.

I think it has improved the community spirit and enabled people to communicate with each other more.

I think it's been amazing how school meals have been delivered to vulnerable families. I feel schools have been under appreciated, getting the children back was an enormous task and school staff are giving over and above what they are normally expected to do while putting themselves, and their families, at risk with an increase in Coronavirus in some areas. Many other council employees are also doing their best but still haven't returned to their offices.

I think overall the council responded well, however, I was a little concerned about a testing centre opening in Caerphilly then after a short while it was closed or moved somewhere else. A little worried that all of us had to go into lockdown when a lot of the cases were in the Caerphilly area. I was very pleased that you offered a click n collect service at the Libraries, but that was not very well advertised I found out after it had been active for some time. Sad that this has now stopped under the new lockdown, not sure why it could not have continued I felt very safe using the service and took every precaution to be mindful of the library staff they were excellent. This is the saddest thing about this whole lockdown insanity services

that people enjoy and need are just shut yet the pubs remained open...I do wonder on times. ALSO, my biggest moan is about the waste recycling centres what an earth is this ridiculous queuing system it takes hours sometimes to get to my local site if this COVID 19 situation is going to continue which it will for another 12-18 months at least then please abandon this system and let the sites run as before, after all, we are all out in the open the risk is low or set up an appointment system I have used this in 2020 when I was in Pembrokeshire clearing my Mums Home, it was fantastic so efficient and much safer for the public and especially the staff as the footfall is low due to the appointments.

I think overall, the way the Council reacted to the pandemic was second to none. Support for the vulnerable in our community was put into place very quickly and those people who I know who received the support have been very appreciative and have said that they wouldn't have managed without it.

I think that all services have worked well under circumstances

I think that CCBC have done a really good job of keeping employees and the borough aware of the facts and as safe as possible.

I think the Council has provided useful information on the various initiatives underway to help people, especially those living alone, and the Gwent Association of Voluntary Organisations (GAVO) has also mobilised its "volunteer help" services.

I think the Council have responded quite well to the pandemic under the circumstances.

I think the Council response re meeting the needs of the most vulnerable was good

I think the County Brorough have been very good in responding to the diffcult times we have experienced

I think the leadership around education has been poor. Very poor opportunities for my children during the first lockdown, my computer was not fully compatible with google classroom etc. No real time learning or lessons all work just sent, if teaching was as simple as reading and completing tasks online we wouldn't need teachers. But we do need that teaching expertise. The move from small bubble face to face teaching to normal class sizes was irresponsible and has led to the situation we have now, constantly worrying if my children have been exposed to Covid at school today, continual breaks in face to face due to others testing positive in their classes. I really think this and it's impact on children, parents and teachers has failed to recognise the mental health impact on them all ba blended approach would have been much better to enable class sizes to be smaller for face to face learning.

I think the way in which the child care hubs was organised was disgraceful. Me and my partner were open and honest about being key workers but still had to pay for our child care place which cost over a thousand pounds where as other families who were less honest about their situations had free child care, there was no fairness or equality in the decision making processes and the communication was very punitive.

I think we have all done very well.

I think you've done very well

I was given an emergency payment of £130 which was deducted the following month.... I would have happily worked with my colleagues with the buddying

system. Furlough lasted 6 months so I have had no money November and December. Great time of year to be left out in the cold

I was not aware of the library ordering service until a friend informed me. It is a good service now I have accessed it.

I wasn't aware of most of the additional support/services so more communication would be good. To my knowledge there has only been 2 test centres in the Borough for very short periods, considering we are in the top 5 highest rates i think they should be more centres open and a better track and trace service

I work for ccbc and everyone else in my office was allowed to wfh and have laptops right from March. My team had to work through the pandemic for two months until we could work from home as we obviously wasn't as important as other people. The more you keep ramping up the rules the more rebellion you will have, start letting people get on with their lives!!!!!

I would like the recyling centres/ tips to be on a booked slot to guarantee entry.

I would like to be told why the council offices is closed to the public. It's big enough for social distancing surely. All on full pay, no redundancies, well done to the dustmen and waste sites

I would say what I noticed on the news that Caerphilly Council did a very good job reference children being fed through the pandemic take my hat off to you I think your staff that worked extremely hard in this time. Also refuse collection round of applause congratulations they never missed a day don't leave a mess hurrah hurrah deserve a Christmas party for the council

If you in rural area felt left out and ignored

It has been more in town than rural areas and a lot of disabled people who did not have help from council or was not in care home did not get help

Less service to the point where the general waste lorry staff who collect our bins were all smoking cannabis in the lorry when collecting bins leaving a strong smell of cannabis in out street. When we called to complain the lady on the other end of the telephone said "can you call back later because I have to take my child to school".

Local medical support was/is rubbish No one from the council knocked on my door to advise on services availability

Mostly talk and no action. Have not seen police or enforcement officers. Residents just did what they want

Much good practice but offset by cyclists, runners and young people many of whom have ignored good practice.

My brother was ill following contact with someone who had COVID 19 and was unable to get anything other than a walk-through test, miles away from where he

lived, even though he lived alone, had nobody to drive him there and could barely walk.

My husband has been shielded and our local Councillor Lisa Phipps advised us to register with CCBC which we did. Fortunately between online shopping and one of our neighbours we managed OK so did not actually use any of the services on offer.

My only help has come via ASDA supermarket who deliver my food as I am on the shielding list I had no help from the borough council.

need to be much stronger enforcement against those not following guidelines as we all suffer from the mindless few yet they dont get punished, set up a register so people not sticking to guidelines (wantonly) are out in it and are then refused or bottom of list for any NHS assistance, benefits etc

No support for BSL users or disabled

Not allowed to see family or friends yet I live next to a town that constantly had people crowded and drunk in pubs, inside and out. Lack of financial support. More interested in booking cars for being parked near their homes despite there being a pandemic, this pandemic has left me and family out of pocket and suffering. Paying a huge amount of council tax as a single person to live in a town that's dirty and surrounded by drug dealings. My bin was also not collected on numerous accounts and I had to send forms twice to get it collected. Makes absolutely no sense to still send children to school when numbers of cases in them are growing. Local hospital doesn't even have an A and E either and we have to travel to Cwmbran instead despite upon building it the community was promised an A and E. With the pandemic still going on, town parking should also continue to be free until this is over with!

Not being able to speak to various departments concerning maintenance grants for jobs agreed before lockdown March 2020

Not enough poeple have kept to the rules. Unless rules are policed, selfish people will ignore them

Not providing childcare for all essential workers made life very difficult. I work at home, but being expected to look after a 1 year old at the same time was not realistic.

Not sure if it is council related but local restriction seem pointless. Living in Caerphilly and working in Newport, having which supermarket I could use in the way home from work seemed crazy. I also live alone in Caerphilly and don't know anyone in the area so technically wasn't allowed to see any one at all during lockdown when support bubbles had to be local. Nothing much done that was relevant to us. It seems that if you own your house, even if you are just on a state pension, that you are invisible and not needing help. We had to rely on my son for help with groceries etc, even though he doesn't have a car.

Nothing specific, job well done. As a person who continued to work as a key worker during the recent months, I thought free parking (Blackwood) was fantastic

Ok in circumstances but monitoring that hospitality sector was compliant when 1st reopened was poor and allowed spread of Covid

older generation sticking to rules but younger ???????????????? need to be adressed.

On the whole, I believe CCBC have acted in a responsible, professional and competent manner to this crisis. However, there are still a few minor issues (e.g. street cleansing) where the poor standards prior to the pandemic have not yet improved.

Only to the above question on homelessness, can't possibly comment as we're not allowed out so won't see it. But certainly hope it's less.

Open spaces have been out of bounds to the local community during the initial lockdown and communities have been left to fend our themselves, hence a stronger community spirit. However, the Council could have done much more to ensure community relations and ensure vulnerable people have support.

other than on line i don't feel there is any connection with the council.i would like to see more police patrols in the penllwyn,there is no connection with other bodies,voluntary groups to check on vulnerable,social services or any other agency,s.we have become a society that lives on line therefore much less human contact

Overall, CCBC has responded very well. However, I am disappointed to see that while schools, cafes, community and leisure centres have re-opened, the daycentre facilities for out residents with a physical or mental disabilities have not been opened.

People appreciate everything more, each other, the space we live in and our recreational space. The importance of our community and everyone taking an interest in looking after where we live for our future generations. I feel that the housing development has taken advantage of the situation and while everyone was worried about staying alive and coping with the situation, a park on the main road was passed and the number of houses to be built went up from 91 to 110 then 125, resulting in our lovely park being taken away and a token one being shoved next to a main road, no one knew about this, not even the two local primary schools. Very underhand and a really horrendous place for a park. Not good for our mental health or well being. Currently the existing park is an attribute, improve this one please because the proposed park is an embarrassment signifying that Blackwood residents are insignificant and we will have to make do with the rubbish that has been passed, regardless that we would rather have the existing one improved please.

People had to make an effort to talk to someone because of the harsh restrictions which we adhered to while watching others do exactly as they like

People have become less sociable, more intolerant, less friendly and respectful and more fearful. The different tiers of Government have taken away our basic freedoms and criminalised innocent activities. I feel the response to covid, implemented by our local Government, is a crime with reference to the Human Rights Act. Governance 'by decree' has undermined the foundation of our democracy.

People snitching on each other, curtain-twitchers, everyone frightened of each other, neighbours taking advantage of the situation to do whatever they want,

Schools seem to have taken any opportunity to close or shorten time there. Primary schools.

Seemed OK but there should be emergency plans for different type of emergencies. These should be made at all levels, throughout organisations and occasionally tested such that all residents are aware of them. These should include measures such that the low income, vulnerable (etc.) do not as far as possible suffer economically when collective effort is required. In this pandemic the young 16+ in low income employment suffered most, particularly if having to look after children at home. This I see as dangerous, as non-compliance to prevention measures by these groups caused suffering to the wider population (young care home staff come to mind!). Regulations need to be passed such that all houses have an emergency equipment cabinet containing masks, visors and other equipment. And if not all houses, then for those working in high risk occupations - NHS. I think employees will have to take more responsibilities for themselves - the Government can't keep huge stocks of just in case basic equipment remote from the people.

Service has decreased a lot due to council staff working from home

shutting down all offices hasn't helped us at all

Signs to remind others to use masks... some don't.

Simply by adhering to the advice given by the Welsh government

Some of the rules are hard to understand. Too many ifs and buts, you need to be a lawyer to understand

Some services responded in a 'knee jerk' manner, as opposed to truly analysing the real needs in the communities.

Sometimes closures were difficult to understand i.e the library and the Youth centre both of which apparently were closed due to lack of adequate ventilation provision. The library is a vital community hub in Risca and was really missed by all age groups. obviously the staff needed to be protected but chemists banks etc managed so why close an important community building? Not everyone has access to the internet printers etc The Youth centre is where the Risca U3a is run from but groups havent met there since march. I run a voluntary group there weekly for older people and could give no explanation on its continued closure. There has been an increase in fly tipping due to frustrations with the local recycling site although refuse and green bag collections have been done regularly throughout the pandemic and I am very grateful to the staff that have done this job. I help care for my elderly mother in law and she has had some minor adaptions done to her house during the pandemic and we were very pleased with the excellent contact promptness of call backs and service delivery with this.

sometimes online services aren't accessible to everyone. sometimes we just want to speak to a human being

Stop using it as an excuse not to cut grass, not to open leisure centres or to explain why bins have not been collected all asking residents not to travel extensively then allocate 4 g pitches to sports teams that have facilities closer to them leaving local clubs having to travel 10 miles to facilities this goes completely against Covid policies . School teaching was appalling from comprehensive school during initial lockdown and then in the most recent lockdown the school hadn't learnt anything still the same poor education being provided

Street cleaning was left for months, residents took it upon themselves to clean streets / cut back overgrown hedges etc. Despite a reduction in traffic, roads are still in disrepair in some areas with potholes apparent / line painting required to traffic calming measures. Hubs were set up but were not run particularly safely initially, attendance for teachers in some instances was voluntary and many took the easy option of not volunteering, I'm sure they would have if it was linked to removal of pay. I am of the view that Council believe they have responded well to this pandemic but there have been inconsistencies and it is unlikely that the redeployment of staff was inefficient given the various skill set shortcomings. Private companies had to make tough decisions to furlough staff or even lay staff off, Council staff were seemingly immune to this leaving a feeling of "us and them / I'm alright Jack", not a great feeling of collective spirit / all being in this together when tax payers are funding part of the salary. The management of social distancing in the Borough obviously hasn't been robust enough, people haven't behaved responsibly across the board and as a consequence, we were the first to have our freedoms restricted. There has been too much salt and not enough sugar for too long, the bar for the release of Caerphilly from its original regional lockdown was too high, there had to be a benefit for good behaviour but there wasn't, as a consequence, residents are simply going to do what they feel is best for them and rules won't be followed by all. Areas of high case rates should be visited by leaders, its pockets of usually remote and forgotten communities that are doing what they want, if the offer of salt without sugar is the policy, strict policing of these areas should be undertaken day and night / CCTV used / prohibiting of vehicle movement out of the area. Residents in areas who don't care about the Country having freedoms removed / putting the vulnerable at risk should have their own freedoms removed, but it has to be policed in a way akin to marshal law. Council and Government have lost swathes of public backing to adhere to the measures set out, there's no direct consequences to those who have nothing to lose, fines won't work if there is no money to pay it, those caught breaching should be forced to undertake community service for the duration of the pandemic, the thought of "work" may force compliance. Keeping people active and engaged is vitally important. Council seem unable to be unsuccessful encouraging its residents to use its Leisure Services. Offering this FOC in communities with a low take up may encourage people to attend a controlled environment / stay out of the pub. There is capacity and as the Centre is open in any event, the commercial impact would be negligible. The leisure service provision in the Borough has been inconsistent and led to me making a complaint, which was resolved to my satisfaction...eventually. Council leaders have tried their best through messaging but ultimately have not succeeded in encouraging their residents to do the right thing, my children have in essence lost a year of their lives they won't get back and I'm of the view that Council have not been harsh enough to manage the position with the pockets of community not complying / rewarding pockets of the community that have demonstrated good behaviour (ie stop the eggs in basket approach - if residents of Gilfach have behaved / have low rates of Covid, give them access to Leisure facilities as a reward, conversely, if Rhymney rates are through the roof with nobody behaving, go into the community to mandate a resolution or simply shut the doors on it)...

When they reopened they caused large ques which caused people to congregate and the last thing you need at the time of a pandemic. Fly tipping definitely increased. This plan was ill conceived. The schools should have been closed d as it it well known children can be asymptomatic spreaders. I have a relative who works in a school in New Tredegar who caught covid by just going to work.

The bin men have been friendly and talked to me. They were the only people we saw for two weeks in the first lockdown and they still wave and talk to me, making sure I am ok. They are wonderful people

The communication has been great - from council to the community.

The communication that the Council have produced to keep residents up to date with the current Covid situation by email, has been excellent. The information is timely, up to date and has provided clear guidance on what residents are allowed and not allowed to do. The Comms has been welcomed.

The community have come together which has been great.

the council has responded well to the pandemic - however i feel that more should be done to reiterate the need for social distancing and the wearing of masks in public places/shops as a lot of people do not seem to understand the need for it and this has caused some anxieties when having to shop.

The council have continued with services which are essential, however other services like leisure centres being closed are in line with saving life's and the councils decisions to protect people is key.

The council have put the residents first and in my opinion they have done a first class job under extreme circumstances

The council lockdown caused so many problems

The emails from Caerphilly Council were informative and relevant to the residents. It made understanding the local restrictions much easier during a confusing period.

The information online has been informative and up to date.

The introduction of the buddy scheme and school meals delivery service was excellent and played a big part in many people's lives, both those receiving the support and those providing the support.

The isolation has had a huge impact on mental health on people who live alone

The IT section need a standing ovation for the way the got most people remote working in such a short space of time. There have been some issues but I think they did an outstanding job.

The last 12 months have been difficult for all, I do feel there seems to be more of a community spirit, people and organisations have often helped in situations with great charity

The leisure facility ruling about using the pool are inadequate. Asking people to change on poolside and leave soaking wet is just beyond a joke. You should contact other councils to see how this could be managed better. Also communication from the leisure centres about the changes in policies were poor

and I would have cancelled membership earlier if I had known what had been put in place prior to attending

The local testing services during the Caerphilly lockdown were not well advertised.

The majority of people seem to be obeying the rules but a small minority keep on doing what they want to agains the rules

The one biggest disappointment is that when the testing centre was open in Rhymney, the council did not make it public. The only way i got to know about it was through my local councillor on facebook. I have talked to neighbours and close family who are not on the internet, and they have told me they were not aware there was a test site.

The one way walking system needed to implemented a lot sooner in the town, more signage needed to be used earlier!

The ongoing use of face masks

The only input I have received is having my bins emptied

The pandemic shows a real need for better emergency planning. Financial doleouts are clearly abusable; they are mad without any meaningful follow up checks of need for grants and outcome. Post lockdown organisation was a shambles, e.g. several people at waste sites just checking driving licences and organising long queues rather than being redeployed on more fruitful aspects.

The partnerships we had built up over many years in CCBC became even more productive and responsive during this time. We all had to quickly adapt how we work to deliver support where needed and this was a time where I believe we all totally pulled together in order to support our most vulnerable customers

The provision of an order and collect library service is probably the most important thing which has improved my quality of life during the pandemic. From the Council correspondence when the current lockdown was introduced early, I am under the impression that this service has now been suspended due to the lockdown - however Welsh Government guidance for this lockdown seems to show that libraries are allowed to continue to provide services provided this is via an order and collect service. If WG guidance allows this, then it is very disappointing of CCBC decide not to provided the service. As someone who lives alone and with family living at a considerable distance meaning that, although eligible to be in a support bubble, it is not practical to do so, access to library books is a really important.

The regular e-newsletters are very useful to help understand what's going on.

The regular updates online from the council have been very helpful and I think they have been pitched just right to help people understand what I happening and keeping us informed

The restutrictions on 'non essential' purchases is ridiculous. I needed knickers as I unexpectedly had my period but couldn't buy any without having to explain to the customer services that I was bleeding. I think this is unacceptable. I also wish someone had reached out to me to use any virtual baby groups as now my son has missed out and is having speech difficulties from lack of social interaction.

The saying Team Caerphilly is laughable, yes there are teams such as refuse collectors etc., out working very hard throughout this pandemic but the majority of council staff, CEO, Directors, Senior Management and Councillors have spent most of their time in their houses having online meetings, this is not management or leadership, they should have at least made an effort to be seen out and about representing their respective departments.

The UK and Welsh government's have tried to handle the pandemic in different ways instead of the whole country, Great Britain, trying to control things the same, trying to gain political points over this issue has been disgraceful and caused untold suffering to the people of the country.

The Welsh government has followed the UK Government and created idiotic rules with no basis in medical fact. It's keeping supermarkets open but cordoning off frying pans and microwaves! It seems to think the virus knows if we are standing up or sitting down in a cafe! The whole situation has had a big reflection on my Mental Health and Wellbeing. For a Disabled person people had a negative effect around me, sometimes it was hard to ask people for help as they did not want to get anywhere near me if I needed help I.e like falling for example, long queues were hard as I couldn't stand for long periods of time, people simply did not offer help, I found it quite frustrating at times.

There is a clear discrepancy in what the UK Government, The Welsh Assembly and the Council want to convey to the public and what the facts are. The media reporting has been deliberately set to cause fear. If you look at all official UK Govt websites the numbers of people testing positive does not justify any lockdown. Caerphilly has not challenged this and just gone along like sheep with questioning anything. The original Caerphilly lockdown was for a tiny minority in Senghenydd when most f the borough had no cases.

These silly surveys wont stop the spread of corona virus.

They will always have 'idiots' to flout the Covid rules - causing the infections rates to rise

Think Caerphilly CBC has done a good job under the difficult circumstances this year. The informative emails and newsletters has been very useful and we found he regular updates on how long queues were at local refuse sites particularly helpful.

Think everyone in council have done a good good considering how hard it has been for them and what they had to work with in regards to cuts and what services were open

this has been a difficult time and i have watched friends falling out due to differing work commitments eq those fuloughed and those working extra hours

This pandemic has caused lots of confusion. Some will say closing the door after the horse has bolted, others will maintain overkill. No answer is truly defined, just the decision of the moment... right or wrong... No one should be criticised for those decisions made. At that time I am sure the decision made is the correct one, and only time will tell if it was indeed correct. As they say, better safe than sorry...

This virus is here to stay and it is not going to go away. Tell people the truth instead of wasting peoples time with false ideology. People are frightened and need to understand in simple talk what a virus is and how it works. Spending tax payers money on idiotic testing centres that stay for a week or two and then disappear is not the way forward as this leads to false security. People need to forward think and prepare for themselves and not rely on the local authority to plan and provide everything for them. We need simple language that people can understand to keep themselves safe. We also need stricter law enforcements on the few who refuse to follow simple rules to keep everyone safe.

Ty Penallta is empty and a waste of money being kept open, heated, lit and cleaned with staff at home You have helped those on low incomes as usual and forgotten about the workers. Free school meals led to free bread, free cakes, free milk, they did not have to worry about working all day then getting to the shops to queue to get food to make their children lunches for school. They had it through the holidays, you've encouraged people to keep having children they can't afford.

Under the ever changing ongoing conditions In my opinion the Council has kept on top of the situation and has acted accordingly.

I'm yet to see the Welsh language version of any of the messages..... Issuing Track and Trace letters, advising the household to isolate to a date in the past is both confusing and a waste of resources. It is particularly confusing with no recipient names and the date of the letter being after the end of the isolation period.

Very little action against those with total disregard for covid resrtrictions /very little action against dangerous parking on yellow lines (Croespenmaen shop)

While I appreciate all the efforts made during this period of volatility overall it appears to me that resources haven't always been used most effectively. Testing/tracing could have been set up earlier for example.

generation. Early on in the lockdown groups of young children i saw gathered together in groups in Risca town. There was no police presence or appropriate persons to break them up. Their parents were either unaware of what they were up to or just didn't care.

Why do you say one thing then do the opposite ?Caerphilly was the first area to go into local lockdown, more than six weeks ago. At the time, its case rate doubled within a few days and reached 117 cases per 100,000 people - the highest rate in Wales and one of the highest in the UK. I have had no problem accessing services and staff have been exeptionally helpful

I have rung several times and explained my problem to different people each time, which is exhausting mentally. Additionally I was told each time that someone would get back to me but nobody did until I wrote to my local AM. Now I have direct number for the people dealing with my requests for which I am thankful but it took a lot of effort.

I have tried a couple of time and hit a dead end for some reason or cannot get the appropriate information.

I like how mobile libraries are run. I feel a weekly mobile type of Council access unit should be set up so all local residents can have regular contact; like some banks do

I made a call in July and I am still waiting for a return call

I think isolated elderley struggle with online phone services maybe have community drop in days I think the Council have done a good job of helping residents access services, by providing lots of information and helping some residents to become e-enabled

i think the website is easy and accessible to navigate already

I think there could be a better online portal - access to the civic amenity site is the biggest problem I found - all other local areas had a booking system to allow residents to access a slot for disposing of rubbish. Many of my neighbours queued for hours to do the same thing that took 15 minutes in another county.

I think you have done really well considering the effect that this pandemic has had on all of us. The speed has been quite slow. I moved from a property in Caerphilly and it took several weeks for a Council Tax refund to be sent out. There was also some confusion as I was told via email it would be a BACS payment but then a cheque arrived. For a few weeks, I was staying with family but have now moved into my own property and it has been several weeks since I completed the online form regarding council tax for the new house and I have still not received anything.

I appreciate the need to finance local services however you need to be more accountable to your residents

I think that the council does not manage its budget efficiently. You spent millions during the Chief Exec pay scandal. It's a disgrace.

I think this year, the council tax rise should be in line with inflation, the Council needs to make sure that inefficiencies in certain services are eliminated and ensure that we are getting value for money in all areas.

I understand how difficult it must be for the Council, but living on a very low income, I cannot afford higher bills of any kind.

I was never asked, or consented to, the lockdown which was always likely to decimate our economy. Politicians decided to not opt for a 'herd immunity' approach and, in doing so, to destroy our communities and the futures of our children. Before any budgets are agreed I believe the people have a right to express themselves via the ballot box and elect new councillors and leaders. I have severe heart failure and am (technically) at high risk from covid. However, I was willing to accept 'my chances

I work 48 hours a week and do not claim benefits we are struggling to pay our Bill's as it is you give reductions to people who are claiming and my bill goes up I pay 140 pound a month as it is we cant afford to eat somedays but we don't get help or from a food bank because we wirk

I work in the public sector when we need a lower financial footprint we restructure and remove underutilised management levels.

I worked for a Local Authority previously and I feel the system is very old fashioned and a lot of money was spent on things like a Major and a Major's car which I feel is a complete waste of money. Also, I don't want to suggest people lose their jobs but I worked with a lot of people who were sat at their desk looking through their phone all day. These people are on good wages for doing nothing. Maybe reshuffle job roles to ensure you are getting value for money for each job role that we pay fo

I would be prepared to pay a greater anount to protect services

I would be willing to pay additional monies however, that is only because I recognise that this money is needed and I am in a situation where I can afford to do this. If this is the option that the council chooses it should be time bound that this increase will only apply for a year. The likelihood is that it will be implemented and then never rolled back! The other issue is that those on low-incomes will not be able to afford this increase so it will end up being paid for them, or push them in

Good quality housing involves the public and private sector and, as such, all residents need financial support to be as environmentally efficient as pos£11,000 last year to insulate my home with next to no support from local government. This current approach is not fair or equitable.

Good quality housing is when there is enough space for families and parking, with all the facilities needed schools doctors and green space. Social Housing is on the increase and single occupation housing too. Not much fun when you have paid a mortgage to have social housing next door.

Good quality housing means well built homes, that are energy efficient, and are built for life.

good quality housing needs a better infer structure, before any housing to be approved, and apprenticeships must be a part as a one craftsman to one apprenticeship person, with a guaranteed position at the end of it.

Good quality housing requires good quality trades being procured to tend to their refurbishment. My own experience of tendering with the Council results in price before quality, even at the risk of health. Appreciate budgets are tight, my own business is in the Construction sector and I won't even submit a tender for CCBC work as its pointless. I note some of the suppliers being used on the housing contracts when travelling through my local community / wider community, and in some instances, you are procuring very poor suppliers who will undertake a sub-standard job. There are some excellent suppliers out there who can provide the services to a high standard, you've got to be prepared to invest in it to ensure these are procured and if it relates to safety, you should not be compromising at all, but you 100% are...knowingly!

Good quality housing should be somewhere where anyone would feel safe to live and should be within easy access to employment opportunities, health care and education settings.

Good quality housing to me is a home that is affordable, secure, structurally sound and has warmth, running water and toilet facilities, enabling any homeless individuals to live in safety, and other members of the community to create homes with their families

Good quality well built structures and fittings, energy efficient, affordable, sufficient for needs.

Homes for the lower paidandvunerable

Homes should be designed to be accessible for older and disabled people as standard, avoiding lack of suitable housing and/or future need to try to adapt/retrofit which is likely to be more difficult and costly in the long term as well as limiting choice for those who need something different from the standard.

Homes that are energy efficient and cheap to run - if the Council are involved with new builds they should be considering Passiv Haus models that mean people will not have to suffer fuel poverty. Solar panel for water and heating and other forms of renewable energy should be prioritised e.g ground source heat pumps

Homes that are 'fit-for-purpose'. An equal mix of housing designed around true demographics, not historical beliefs. Underoccupancy should be dealt with in a sensitive manner to free up larger homes for larger families. Funding should be invested in the outdoor environment to make it a pleasant place for residents to spend their time, particularly where there is a high concentration of Council homes so residents don't feel they are forgotten about.

I live in a brand new flat via United Welsh Housing Association, so i understand good quality housing. Providing more quality housing will improve the lives of so many people, as long as it's done thinking of the environment too.

I think it is important to consider the environment outside the dwelling. Ensure a brightness around the properties with trees, flowers and a hidden parking space for the wheelie bins if flats. If the outside of a property is drab, then it takes away any pride or joy of living in your home.

I think it would be good to build new estates as well as improving the old ones

I think people should not expect to have a house if the council (tax payers) have to pay for this and instead basic flats should be provided.

I think that the WHQS improvements have been very beneficial for all concerned and this is definitely the way forward and a reasonable quality bathroom and kitchen are an essential minimum but there are too many inconsistency's. The external cladding/insulation installed in Lansbury Park and Gray Y Rhacca for example was very good indeed but in my area (Trethomas) we didn't get any external cladding, just new pebble dash outside which whilst looks clean and tidy, some money saving insulation would have been much appreciated, I can only assume you had run out of money to do the same in Trethomas as you did in Lansbury Park and GYR. I think these 'green' initiatives are essential but now that we have left the EU I assume there will be no future funds available for this type of thing and good quality housing comes at a cost.

Nearly every appliance in the modern British home is foreign made and nearly every vehicle on the road is either foreign made or made in the UK by a foreign owned company, providing work for foreign workers or profits for foreign companies. I'm not against foreign investment but if a foreign company has problems in its own country or better offers from other foreign countries it will be the British subsiduary that will close first just like Ford Bridgend and Ineos opting for a French car factory. One thing that we should learn from the covid epidemic is that we cannot rely on foreign companies to provide us with basic items such as PPE and drugs etc. we have to be more self sufficient as a country, and to start making more of the day to day items we need. We are relying too much on foreign companies to provide us with goods and services at the expence of British workers, and British companies. We have let so many British ideas and inventions fall by the wayside because of lack of support from all previous governments, an example of this is that we are now relying on EDF and Toshiba to build the next generation of nuclear power stations because we have let the technology "slip away". Our manufacturering base is rapidly becoming just an assembler of parts made in other countries providing very often low skilled employment. The only real way to create wealth and employment is to produce more goods and services and this can only be kick started at UK government level. As regards the local economy, people will only start spending in the local economy if they have money and they will only have money if they have jobs, then local firms can take on more staff. The city deal as I see it is well intentioned but after the transport links and infra structure is completed where will the jobs be where will those skills gained be used, how are we going to sustain those people who will then be out of work. There has to be something to run along side it or to take over once its completed.

Giving people a purpose and aspiration to better themselves and others is vital, investing in people to succeed is pivotal and any investment made towards that should be encouraged. People may take a life decision to move away from the City Centres to balance their time working from home, transportation to the Cities is vitally important and having a train station near to my home was important in my decision making process to move house. It would be helpful if the suppliers improving the road / rail networks recruited from the local community, schemes of this nature already exist in some settings but the options to recruit are limited to very low skilled people with low ambition. Aptitude, attitude and pride in workmanship are keys to success, work should be done to work on those areas to ensure people are fit for employment / not just getting people "in to work". There are many poor tradespeople in the construction sector who do not posses the right personal attributes, opportunities are available for young people especially, investing in them will be an investment in the future as they then look to create businesses of their own. Improving the % of people in work is important to me when it comes to the local economy, too high a % of people I meet in the school playground when collecting the kids are unemployed and have no intention of finding a job, their children will follow if they don't know what good looks like so more effort should be made of getting everyone involved in work of some sort, "forced" voluntary for the community or otherwise to have a purpose and to put back into the community (as opposed to take out of it). The Northern part of Caerphilly requires investment, high streets for some sections of retail will always be required, attracting popular retailers fit for the area's spending power (such as Primark, may need to renovate existing shops to accommodate size) would be of benefit, higher end retailers would attract those from the City to the suburbs to locate in the area and in turn, with increased spending power, the likes of Waitrose or electronic retailers may come along. Housing developments for higher end housing would also be of benefit and may attract business owners to relocate, be interesting to see the take up of the small housing development on Van Road (ideally want entrepreneurs not retired people entering the area). Give local business an advantage during tendering opportunities to win, especially if they are of good quality, if you procure poor quality, individual employees do not improve and the buyer doesn't benefit, its important those procuring know what good looks like and be held to account for procuring rubbish..

Investment in our town centres is vital. They should be attractive places that enocurage local businesses which in turn, would attract visitors and make them thriving, vibrant parts of local communities where people enjoy visiting and can shop locally without having to venture further afield.

Investment in town centres but also retail parks. Units in Gallagher business park have been empty since it was built, CCBC need to attract a reputable non food, non DIY business here.

Inward investment bringing in industry that will last, to provide the jobs that still have not replaced the losses in mining and other manufacturing industries over the past 40 years. More self-employment is an answer, but only a small one. Many of the excellent small businesses set up within the CCBC area are providing great service, but have very small employee numbers. We are desperately short of larger scale industry. I am aware this is hard - MTCBC as an example has wasted millions over many years providing inward investment subsidies for companies that have not stayed in the area beyond their contracted time period. This is not an easy job, but one that is

critical to ensure the survival and health of towns like Bargoed (which looks absolutely grim when compared to the 1960s when it was vibrant and full of quality shops) and Caerphilly (which is currently very sad, where even charity shops are shutting, with empty shops being taken over by a plethora of barber shops).

Visitors from outside the area are unlikely to return if these facilities - and this includes well maintained public toilets in town centres! - are unavailable. Cinemas and venues for cultural activities such as upgraded Miners' Institutes and former Chapels must be cherished, nurtured and developed to offer entertainment and education to everyone across the whole age spectrum. Town centres without these attractions are bound to decline. Niche food places do well in the busier parts of Cardiff. The problem is, you don't have the right clientele in smaller villages for the work/eat out culture. But you do have retires, families and if you get some shops of interest in, the weekend shoppers. So create a food space that's trendy, healthy, family friendly and more like the cafe cultures you see in other countries snow, rain or shine they are ready for it. It's time to update, refresh and move with the times

Probably it will be important to support hybrid models of business, with people able to browse and buy in person but potentially also to offer things like order and collect (collecting locally can be combined with using other face to face services where home delivery generally isn't). Going to an actual shop and browsing and buying is a wholly different experience from ordering online - the physical experience is more sociable, more fun, more of an experience - these things increase well-being a reduce loneliness as well as supporting business. Stop the emphasis on edge-of-town commercail developments. Provide grants for changes of use of unused shops etc. to housing.

Stopping supermarkets selling certain products and tax them to the hilt. Cheap supermarkets have killed the town centres.

Street market

Street markets for small businesses? Lower rates for businesses to set up. I think the green agenda needs to be explored further with regards sustainability and refill shops etc.

Strong leadership and provision for a healthy maintenance budget

Subsidised rents on empty commercial properties to encourgae occupation. Free parking is vital to keep numbers up

Supply a car park which people can use. Business will adapt to change of buying habits if the council supports in business rates.

Support for high street shops to move online. Help to equip them with the skills, tech and support needed to continue as a business in the current climate

Support independent businesses so that the town centres offer something unique.

Support small businesses to have an on-line presence and develop click and collect schemes.

Systemically supporting the growth of individual shops and businesses in the high streets of small towns (and villages) without the presence of chain stores and especially multinationals. If people want these types of shop they are far more likely to go to large town centres where there are numerous choices anyway. Regenerating the local shops will not be achieved by leaving it to individuals trying to make a go of it, as the failure rate would be high and Council money would be wasted. Instead, research into what facilities and services the local people want on a day to day basis rather than specialist shops, then offering initial start up assistance to people wanting to fulfil these roles would be far more effective. For example, the research identifies that people want a wholefood shop, greengrocer, hairdresser, homeware store, independent bookshop, so the council (not a consultant) produces a local plan advertising that there are grants available for anyone wanting to provide these services (either a private business/working for the council owned service). Planning permission is such that it can't be used for any other type of business than the one specified. Local people are then reminded that there is a comprehensive range of shops offering what the community have said they need on a day to day basis, and this is a way to reduce carbon footprint and emissions for the county. As it becomes established other beneficial independent businesses which help the community, such as building societies, solicitors, café's and so on will be attracted and flourish. Increasing the activity in a given location will also assist those existing businesses which have managed to survive already, and the hub will become a more inviting place to visit. Hopefully it would create a virtuous circle not only for the local economy, but for the environment and in empowering individuals to contribute to reducing global warming. I think that emphasising the impact we can all have in this way from the initial consultation onwards would be crucial in its success. If a pilot scheme proves it is a workable solution, this can be used to showcase the project to others interested in becoming involved in similar projects elsewhere in or out of the county.

Take control of buildings in Pontymister area that have been neglected and are an eyesore to visitors. Someone needs to take responsibility for Tesco pedestrian walkway just before the river bridge which is badly overgrown and littered.

tax incentives

That will be a very difficult. Maybe more use can be made of Caerphilly Castle, with more music events or "Big Cheese type Weekends". The sports facilities at Ystrad Mynach & the rugby pitch in Caerphilly could also be used for rugby or football matches, possibly Welsh Rugby "younger teams" against their UK equivalents".

That's a difficult question. Our towns, I live in Bargoed, doesn't have enough businesses of different types. We have too many haridressers, barbers, nails bars and not enough shops selling useful things to get by day to day. We would not buy online if we could shop locally.

That's a good one! who knows! Towns like Bargoed where i am from need radical action. Half the town needs to be knocked down and reconfigured mainly around the Square and half way down

the main street the rest needs to be turned over to housing. We have to get real and appreciate that retail has changed forever lets get smaller but more Relevant and exciting.

thats why you have Bussiness mangers to sort out that problem

The 'face' of the high streets needs to be welcoming not boarded up. It seems only charity shops can 'afford' the rates.

The answer to that needs a smarter brain than mine!

The Castle is a big attraction to encourage visitor - more men's shops for over 60s and shops for older folks in town.

The crafts and activities completed by disadvantaged people in out of the way units could enhance our high streets by being visible and valued. They could encourage people to pop in to do pottery , art, drama etc. The participants could then informally support as well as gain a new activity themselves and reduce isolation for all

The free parking you are implementing is a great start. Make the high streets in some towns different. Common complaints amongst my friends all over Wales is that is doesn't matter whether you are shopping in Blackwood, Neath or Bridgend (or even Cardiff, Bath or Swindon), all the shops are the same. Caerphilly could focus on making is a hub of unique and different shops that encourages people to come there as they will find something different not at other shops. Emphasis the environmental factors and encourage places that are meeting that agenda with make and mend shops, etc. If the council focussed on a specific area and then went all out to lead the field in that area, this could be good for the local economy. Also need to be better at publicising what we do. Only seem to hear bad stories about Caerphilly on the BBC a significant push on more positive news stories. Again, unique things that catch the public eye and imagination. By working more closely with business perhaps we can look to be more dynamic, proactive and bold and less institutionalised and staid.

The Internet is killing our high streets, perhaps quality shops would attract people and businesses. The only future for town centres is non-retail. Online before lockdown and covid was the future of retail, it is pure nostalgia to try and resurrect high street stores. Evening and nighttime events council sponsored might help

The pandemic and local restrictions really highlighted that unless you were doing DIY or needed a haircut or a kebab there was nothing else to do. No big retail chains, no clothing outlets other than supermarkets. There are retail units which were built a number of years ago and have remained empty but yet we still build more. Shouldn't we be engaging with big chain stores to attract them to Caerphilly as part of new retail developments? Planning department need to stop granting permission for kebab shops, hairdressers, barbers and bookmakers.

The town centres and high streets are shocking. The main town of Caerphilly for example, I grew up in the area and it was a vibrant shopping centre, I lived away for many years and on my return was thoroughly shocked at how down trodden the main town in this borough now looks. High Streets thought the UK are suffering closures but within the Caerphilly Borough I see no hope for the high street. Pretty much all the major chains have left, I don't believe it is possible to attract any major chains and without the hook that they provide to bring shoppers in then the small businesses won't survive either. It would take a massive programme of change to entice any quality businesses. I don't believe CCBC has the ability to do that.

There is a lot of talk about revitalising high streets. The pessimist would say this is a non starter. However, given that investment is the nam of the game, then you have think how to do this from the off. The main reasons that people buy online are the so called convenience of being able to do this from home. All very well if you like constantly sending stuff back in the post. If you're trying to create vibrancy in high streets then make it feasible to attract new businesses (start ups etc) and have clear ideas about what kind of high street you are trying to develop. Mae the environment one that peole would wish to gravitate to (the French are quite good at this). Develop an environ that is conducive to visiting. Variety of shops is a given. Street layout is paramount (this doesn't necessarily mean pedestrianisation, which often means deliveries to

premises suffer, but careful 'control' of traffic flow). Build a strong argument for major retailer to consider moving there. Limit the amount of 'repeat' businesses. Lower rents to attract niche markets/ business ideas. Last but certainly not by a long chalk least consult young(er) people. It's their future you are trying to build. A consortium of young people on your council wouldn't come amiss.

There is a major economic reconfiguration taking place and the impact of automation has yet to be felt. How can the council possibly pretend that it can anticipate the havoc this will wreak?

There needs to be no boarded up shops! Should council services move to the high street and become shops, and the council supermarket (head office) be closed?

There should be more focus on those offering personal experiences or uniqueness. Smaller boutique type shops and fresh local produce, not large franchises.

There will always be a need for high street clothing retailers, attracting a few big names such as New Look, Primark, River Island would encourage the younger generation into the town centres to spend. Technology retailers such as Apple only have a presence in major cities, encouraging those to locate here based on the catchment (in light of the improved transport links) would draw in people from neighbouring boroughs. A cinema complex would be welcomed, again, you have to travel to those. Household named restaurants and pubs with beer gardens (hardly any North of Caerphilly) would do well in the area, there's likely to be a demand after Covid. Attracting visitors and expenditure won't work if the bigger names aren't attracted, you have to attract retailers that aren't nearby / limited to major cities and support this with the infrastructure in terms of parking / transport / food & drink by overhauling some of the Town Centres, short term commercial pain for long term gain. Doing nothing is not an option and will lead to the town centres dying or becoming areas full of takeaways / "old man" pubs leading to obesity and general ill health.

They need to be attractive places that we want to visit. Our flowers are beautiful but there few interesting shops or pavement cafes culture. New resturants have appeared - let support them and existing ones to stay. What has happened to the hotel development in Caerphilly town centre? Cost of train travel needs looking at. Pop up shops? Reduced rates?

This needs a young person "think tank" to ascertain what the future adults feel is important. Free and adequate parking facilities are essential to regenerate town centres. Reductions, permanently, in business rates to encourage small businesses.

Tidy up the area, and stop vandalism.

To attract businesses to the area it would help businesses if the business rates could be reduced on an increasing scale over a 3 year period

To be honest as a car driver one of my biggest issues about going to town centres is the cost of parking, some town centres are not easy to get to via public transport and as my previous note, it's not very cheap here and on times not very well co-ordinated - Buses/Trains we are getting better but still a way to go. I have been to Blackwood a few times during lockdown and the council has suspended the parking charges this was a good idea. Long term this needs to be looked at as with the change in shopping habits you will have to work hard to get people to come to Town, the lack of public conveniences does not help and if an area does not look prosperous very hard to get the people to come and enjoy the experience. Lots of closed shops are not good. Maybe you may have to look at your business council tax charges to encourage more business to set up and the help existing ones thrive. Difficult times and a difficult question to answer having spent time in France so many people shop locally over there and shops such as bakers, grocers, butchers seem to thrive.

To make the town centres 'pedestrianised' and free parking

To reduce rates on vulnerable business

Town centres need to become leisure attractions in themselves ideally offering a variety of attractions (some of which are already present); places to eat, unique shops etc. Narbeth is a good example for towns of a certain size to follow.

Town centres should be interesting places to visit with a variety of shops, community and art facilities. High streets need to be clean, accessible and safe to encourage visitors and businesses. Modern and sustainable public transport is essential.

Town centres will become more about experiences than retail: restaurants, cafes, festivals, brand experiences, leisure activities and gaming (escape rooms, etc). Much should be made of galleries, historic buildings, and the stories of the past that make each town centre unique. Is there a business that has been going for 100 years? Give it funding to hugely increase its presence online, on TV, in magazines, etc. Let's make them legendary so people come from far and wide. At the opposite end of the spectrum, help new business to grow. How about a three month new business "pop up" season where empty shops are temporarily used as showrooms for new business at no cost? Maybe some will grow enough to be able to open a permanent shop. Denser housing should also be considered in town centre locations. This would likely be met with some resistance to begin with but has the benefit of increasing footfall in the town by creating places where people can live, work and play, as opposed to suburban housing estates where car use is mandatory.

Try cleaning the areas up first.

Try to make shops rents affordable to prevent empty shops

The most self-defeating thing town centre shops do is to close in the evenings, when their most affluent customers are no longer at work. They would do better to open from 11-7 or 12-8. As we move towards the machine learning age, and many traditional jobs are set to decline / change / move offshore, suitable provision of appropriate non-academic skills provision must be substituted for the drive to university courses. The future jobs market will need more hands-on workers - in building, automotive, maintenance, personal service, caring roles. A continued drive for 50% of students to go to university will see the present trend of degree-qualified graduates having their aspirations dashed as they wind up in low paid jobs. At the same time their nongraduate peers will have been in satisfying work for three years and will not have a debt hanging over them. To achieve this Further Education colleges need to be expanded and the feelings of being "also rans" by the students eradicated. The provision of vocational courses needs to be expanded to fill the upcoming skills shortage. The reason I say this is I am a retired senior public service officer, who moved into further education on retirement. I have observed, as have many others, the dissatisfied stream of graduates with non-vocational degrees having the promises of the Graduate Premium fail when trying to get what they consider to be suitable employment. In the meantime their peers having had apprenticeships, or other vocational education, are successfully earning in satisfying jobs. Allied to this a re-adjustment is required in the public's, and government's, valuing of what are considered to be "low skilled" jobs, but are in fact merely low paid jobs, but with tremendous societal value - witness the newly minted "key worker" status during Covid!

Teachers have almost always entered the profession from University and have known little else. As with all jobs, without a change of purpose / direction, engagement can suffer detrimentally and teaching children for decades results in many teachers simply turning up to teach as opposed to wanting children to learn. Attracting young and ambitious teachers who ideally have a working knowledge in another sector / embrace technology is very important, ensuring the built environment and equipment is first class would be an attractor (conditions are as important as pay). Many schools are struggling with their budgets, head teachers are likely to be struggling with all manner of responsibilities and some won't be cut out to manage what is a small business given their backgrounds. Engaged and motivated teachers, state of the art buildings, schools promoting a balanced educational setting (not just theory, balanced with sport), equal opportunities for all

(girls can play football, not just netball...but aren't allowed in some school!) are key. Given the impact of home learning, it will also be important to assess the impact carefully when children return to the school setting, some will be left behind if not given the opportunity to catch up, that may mean keeping children down a year as opposed to setting them up to fail. Parental contact with the school has been non existent due to the virus, with the exception of one teacher, there has been no face to face contact from staff xxxx about my child's progress in 2 years (just a couple of phone calls, nothing pertinent about her specific progress). In terms of the demolition of the old schools, be great if local and reputable suppliers could be used..

Teachers need to be able to discipline kids today. I know so many teachers who face verbal abuse everyday. Kids under 16 should have a curfew.

Teachers teaching. Blended learning needs them at the end of a computer screen teaching a class. I am not a teacher and if they used their timetables to teach children would have access to the same teaching as if in school. To support this the most vulnerable families need your support on a means tested basis.

Teachers that can actually deliver a package of learning suitable for the learners to actually learn go back to basics teaching learners how to read and write properly first before categorising them

Teaching children to respect others. To be polite and caring which not all children have learnt

teaching respect and discipline

Teaching the children having more support

That all children are treated fairly with the same opportunities and funding. Welsh medium schools or English should have the same funding and same opportunities

That all children can access education and have as level a playing field as possible. Also wellbeing comes before everything. I am an educator and question whether schools have been instrumental in spreading this virus. Health comes first! We should not put families at risk. Families have been terrified sending their children into a breeding ground for disease!

that all children get a flying start in life, free childcare from the age of 2 for ALL not postcoded areas or areas of deprivation

That all children get the very best start in life.

That all children have access to the tech they need for school

That all pupils are given the opportunity to a fair and night quality education.

That children have access to good standard of education and opportunities which widen their horizon and make them think longer term. Need a focus on vocational courses a some trades are in demand.

That children have face to face education full time

That children have plenty of face face learning

That children leave school literate and numerate, well mannered. That disruptives receive a quality education outlisde of mainstream. That further education is re-instated ie languages, craft, IT

That children receive an education that is meaningful and sets them on the right path for the rest of their lives, whether that is an academic or vocational path. Too much emphasis is put on teaching children to pass exams, which is wrong for the child and wrong to judge schools on. The curriculum should encourage children to develop their skills and their passions in whatever they want to do.

That children receive good quality education in buildings that are fit for purpose. For me personally, I would like to see more local Welsh language provision. Children from Llanbradach, Bedwas, Trethomas and Machen have to travel by bus to their catchment school in Ysgol y Castell. I wonder how many parents are put off applying for a Welsh school because they either have to take the child to school themselves or when available put a 3 or 4 year old on a bus to go to school. For many parents it might not be an option to transport their child to school until they become school age

That children's educational needs are fully met. That children receive nutritional school meals.

That each child receives an education by a method that suits them.

That education is available, accessible and relevant for all age groups, incomes, and abilities because we can all learn something and we never stop learning

That education meets the needs of all at every level as education is the key to improving prosperity of everyone within the community.

That every student disabled or not are given the chance to learn in a school or college that is suitable to their needs

That everyone has access to the same learning and opportunities. Being from a low income family, I took advantage of the library services during my academic years and still do!

That EVERYONE is treated equally and all children have access to the same things

That it is of same standard as other education establishments in neighbouring boroughs

That my children are given the education they deserve whilst being treated fairly and with respect

That our qualified students can gain employment in profit making businesses locally.

That schools are fit for purpose and that every child has opportunities

That schools are fit for purpose/ offer equitable opportunities to students in this area compared to other parts of the nation

That Teachers are paid more and not treated as 'child minders'

That teachers can teach and control their class

That the children and staff are same

That the children have a decent education, not solely based on exam results. Not al kids are academically minded

That the children have all the right equipment and books and enough one to one teachers

That the kids go to school 5 days a week 8.30 am - 3.30 pm Not 2 pm and forget inset days

that the schools and college buildings are maintained to a high standard to encourage students to attend and to give staff a great boost. A badly maintained building is so discouraging and I speak from experience

That the schools have funding they need to be able to provide the best learning environment

That the standard of education is high. That the teachers employed are of the highest calibre and willing to 'go the extra mile.' I think it is important to ensure that children, even from the poorest backgrounds, are inspired by education and that they all have aspirations to realise their potential.

That there are plenty of Welsh speaking schools

That they are treated fairly with equal opportunities. Some children will need more help than others but deserve to have the same opportunities. My nephew may be on the spectrum, he's 4 and has spent much of his school life sent home because he can't play/isn't listening/disruptive etc hes missed out quite a bit and those early years are important. They have applied for assistance but the process is very long and tedious. There are lots of kids like my nephew, schooling needs more people qualified to recognise and deal with children like him. The service is stretched and needs more investment and support so that these kids don't go so long without help and potentially fall through the net.

That those who are from underprivileged backgrounds are not held behind because of technology poverty, food poverty, cultural poverty and more.

That you are motivating the right pupils and not putting square pegs into round holes . Yes motivate all but we can't all be Albert Einstein.

That young people leave school with qualifications that the local employers require. The ability to communicate especially verbally is of utmost importance.

Thats it is available, consistent and accessible

Thats pupils are encouraged to speak fluently with good English. Each Teacher in every class can play a part in correcting bad grammar. That reading is encouraged despite hi-tech. That respect is taught and good behaviour

The 2019 P.I.S.A. report showed eudcation in Wales is the worst in the UKL - again, stop giving priority to Welsh medium education. Promote English medium schools

The ability to give every child the the tools to achieve the best they cab

The care of school buildings is a huge responsibility so that pupils have a clean and productive environment to learn in. Making sure pupils are fed properly during school time is another priority. Making sure pupils are taught the right classes for them to prosper in life.

The Council are spending a fortune on 'new schools'. Bricks and mortar and coloured cladding do not make a good school - that is just a veneer. It is the teachers that make a school and perhaps there should be a slight change in direction here.

The current performance of secondary schools in the area is very poor compared to those in more prosperous areas of Wales (e.g. Vale of Glamorgan). The removal of 6th form in local schools was a big mistake and this should be reinstated.

The education of 4 - 16 year olds.

The education sector is trained and educated in what is correct to eat (5-a-day no added sugar foods etc); that they demonstrate their own healthy lifestyles as part of their employment; receive assistance to improve health as necessary; and finally are now prepared to teach the same to precious school children!

The learning environment needs to be a place where students want to be and can feel safe, structurally appealing and within their locality. Opportunities for physical activities/lifestyle should be widely available and of the highest standard. Schools should receive adequate funding to keep up with technological advances.

The most important thing is for your child to have good teacher. You can have the most amazing schools but unless you have a good teacher they are worthless. Unfortunately, teachers have so much bureaucracy to follow and to meet so many different objectives that they have lost sight of the basics. Reading, writing and maths! We need to go back to basics in this area. Also, children's well being is of the utmost importance. PE needs to be given a higher priority in primary schools, not only is exercise good for your mental health, in an era where obesity is rising it is also good for children's physical well being. Every primary school should have a dedicated PE teacher. I'm not a teacher myself however from what I understand teachers have planning to do every year, this always amazes me as children of a certain age need to learn the same things each year. Surely if Wales or even at Caerphilly level appointed a 'planning' manager for each year group at primary level this would save hundreds of teachers hours of planning time. This plan would then be sent out to each teacher. Each year group in Wales/Caerphilly would be following the same plan and have a similar level of education. I understand the pressures that schools are under but I have been really disappointed with the level of learning provided by schools. Also, no thought has been given to the fact that a lot of parents work full-time and are unable to both work and be a home teacher. Schools need to do more online face to face interaction.

THE most important thing to me is that parents have a choice and a say in how their children are educated. Alarmingly, local councils are dictating how and when children receive sex education and education relating to 'diversity'. If humanity is to be truly diverse then it must be accepted that the freedom for some of us to reject changes in education policy should be respected or, at least, properly debated. The concept of Government by consent has been replaced by Governance by decree and this is very worrying.

The planning team & the education team need to consider the councils GREEN pledge Only expand on brown field sites - green field sites should be protected from development Sport & leisure provision is important and should be protected for Future generations

The quality of education as a lot of schools in are Borough are not in the green category. Also taking on board young peoples views and developing a curriculum for life.

The quality of teaching and facilities

The schools curriculum is set and you have little control over that but ensuring that children have mastered the basics or reading, writing, mathematics and IT use is fundamental. They also need to

know about managing their own resilience, wellbeing and ambition. However, education is not limited to children and in many areas it is the lack of education of the parents that holds children back. What are we doing to address the lack of education of failed generations?

The schools development over recent years has been good.

To support early learning Very important for children to read at an early age

To support schools to maintain high standards of education.

To teach those pupils respect for others and discipline

To teach youngsters the basics of a strong community. Education is the key and need heavy investment. We need to teach right from wrong, self respect and respect for other people.

To try to have continual in school education for all

To understand national and world trends in education .As our planet shrinks we need to be aware of world trends

Todays students provide the foundation for future economic growth, so it is an investment in our future. Continue to encourage all forms of education to include support for Universities and colleges.

Too old to comment but for the young offer as many incentives as are necessary to raise expectations

Truly good standard

Unless you can offer good prespects of getting a job - young persons will not see the benefit of education! Give young people something to aim for

Update our school buildings, there must be so much money wasted on heating, hardly any of the buildings are eco friendly. More outdoor education and teaching of life skills in line with the new Wales curriculum.

I have given up my diesel powered vehicle and bought an E-bike as my every day transport. I try to set an example to other people by showing that there are alternatives to jumping into the car. I have also heavily invested in solar technology and smart heating/lighting controls for my home. I use water wisely and try not to waste too much. Small shops could be supported to use paper bags, or a local company encouraged to develop bags for shops that use the same type of materials used in recyclable bags used for food waste or that now come around some magazines through the post. All shops should be encouraged to stop using plastic, and should sell re-usable vegetable bags rather than providing plastic bags. Energy usage is obviously hugely important, as is provision of public transport to reduce traffic on our roads. The public transport system within CCBC is very patchy - I cannot for example get to my son's house in Llancaich without taking 2 buses and a train, a journey of 1.5 hours instead of the 17 mins it takes by car. The development of the Metro system is long overdue and taking too long to implement, and even when fully operational it will be inadequate to meet the needs of the communities it aims to serve. There is unlikely to be a network in my lifetime that will replace that destroyed with the closure of the railways 50 years ago, so what can be done to fix this issue of reducing traffic usage is beyond my imagination.

How are we supposed to charge an electric car? The council needs to help us to help. Also, I own an ex-council house. Neighbouring council houses had external insulation provided by the council, while some private owners had it provided for free under a different scheme, but then the funds ran out and we missed out. We usually don't qualify for any grants, but that doesn't mean we can afford to spend tens of thousands on home energy upgrades. More support for private home owners please!
